Bonney took the mound for Tygh and held up for a few innings when Morris smashed out a clean home run and then he was swamped by hits. Hooker relieved him and finished the game. Score 7 to 3. It was a nice clean game and the rooters called for another the following day. Promptly at 3 bells Hooker the "elober ball" artist took the mound for Tygh with a cold cynical smile upon his face and with his pockets bulging out filled to overflowing with slippery elm, as he limbered up with his round house outs, insinuates, drops, spitter and terrific speed it looked bad for opposing batters. Nye was the first one to face the music and as he stood in the box trembling it looked like slaughter. But, low and behold he hit one and for the first time in all base ball history there were eight outfielders in the game and they all seemed to be lining up out in right field and all very busy relaying the pill back to the home plate; in the meantime Nye was getting a drink and taking twenty minutes for lunch, haying galloped around for the first run. A decided change came over the face of the once whirlwind pitcher; it was a look of revenge. Next to get a hit was Morris. Again the relay team shifted into right field and Art trotted home for the second come run, and so it went round and around until the score book recorded 22 to 2. There is a movement on foot to give the noted flinger a citation for his bravery. Skinner worked for the Kolts and they looked like peanuts as they slipped across the corners and it was a holiday for our outfielders, not a ball being caught. The hitting of Morris and Nye was the feature of the series. The Kolts for the first time in a long while showed their old time fighting spirit and made a whirlwind finish of the season. A big banquet will be spread at the Kelly Sunday night and the players and their wives will meet and discuss the records of the past season and disband, going back to their work singing, "I am old but I am awfully tough."

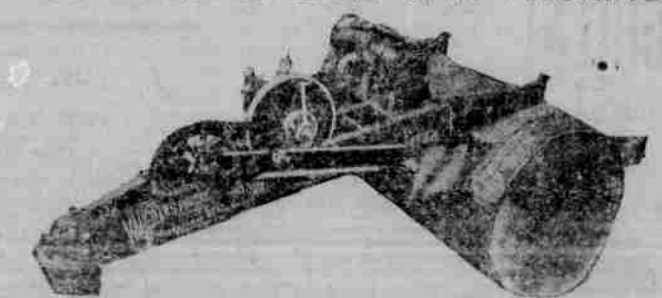
