## \$35,000 SIGNED UP SINCE JULY 4TH

### Irrigation Water

The Wapinitia Irrigation company has created quite a stir since the Fourth of July, having taken water contracts for \$35,000 since that date. A large force of canal workers are now building the canal feeder from Frog creek to the main canal headgate, a distance of about four miles. The company's engineers are using high explosives in this work as it saves time and they believe it to be a direct saving over the cost of labor in many places.

As soon as the canal extension survey is completed on the lower Wapinitia plains the lateral system will be extended to the ranch of Otis Chastain.

Listed among the heaviest investors in the water project are: A. A. Britton, Slusher Bros., Otis Chastain, Bothwell and sons, Frank Fleming, J. S. Brown, I. C. Stanford and John Ward.

The company reports alfalfa doing nicely in the instances where good stands were secured. Two cuttings have been put in stack and the third will be harvested soon. About three tons to the acre for the first season with approximately five tons for the two year crops is now assured.

Motorists and sheep men who cross or visit the Wapinitia plains do not need to carry the obsolete water bags and tanks. The district will enter a strong exhibit at the Tygh Valley fair is predicted by N. C. Hedin, project manager of the company.—Chronicle.

## GRANT MAYS DIES IN PORTLAND

Grant Mays, prominent cattleman of this section of the state, owner of large acreages of land, one of the big men of this city, judged by the standard of service, dropped dead suddenly Sunday in Portland at 12.30. One moment he was chatting pleasantly with his wife, the next he was dead.

He moved to Portland about four years ago and has since made his home at 52 Trinity place.

Mr. Mays was born near The Dalles, on December 14, 1866, and was married on January 18, 1907, to Miss Vesta Bolton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. Bolton. Mr. Mays was well known among cattle men of the state and northwest, owning a large cattle ranch in Crook county and being interested in holdings of cattle and land in Montana.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Elk's temple in this city. Rev. D. V. Poling of Corvallis officiated at the services. The Elks' burial ritual was used impressively at the grave.

During the hour from 2 to 3 o'clock the business houses of The Dalles closed in tribute to Mr. Mays.—Chronicle.
