If a school is worth what we think it is to a community then the time of the teacher is valuable. For this reason it will be our policy in future to discourage agents from taking our time away from our classes, even if they think us rude.

Those having little ones for the primary room should start them immediately, or at least by the end of the first month. This is important to the progress of your child as well as for the interest of his class.
