Market Road

Mass meeting held in Shattuck's hall, Maupin, Oregon, Monday night boosting the Market Road special election for November, 1919, demonstrated beyond all doubt that Maupin Road District is united for permanent good road construction. Wapinitia Commercial Club held a mass meeting Saturday the 11th and a great interest was shown in the new market road plan made in the interests of the outlying districts. A delegation from Wapinitia Commercial Club headed by President J. S. Brown and Secretary N. C. Hedin went to Maupin to aid in introducing the good roads movement Monday night.

The election in November will call for affirmation of a special 6 mill road levy, which will raise approximately \$8,400 in Maupin and Wapinitia district. The Market Road Fund and Wasco county agree to match this amount, thus totaling approximately \$25,000.00 to be spent on the main market roads within the district for a character of improvement that will be decided upon and definitely stated before the November election. This wonderful offer comes as a bright beacon light to rural communities and carries practically \$3 for \$1 vote, all of

which will be spent within our road district.

The Market Road 1 mil tax law for Oregon was passed during the recent legislature session and is made available to road districts for 1920 construction along the lines above outlined.

Now is the time for every enterprising citizen to boost his home district and aid by explaining to the Doubting Thomas Class the walls will not fall in on us in case we build some few miles of surfacing so that we are not completely isolated in the winter time.
