Say, Mr. Farmer, do you think is paid John Powell to irrigate his crab apple trees this season? He sold about \$10 worth of fruit per tree—but you just ask him. Powell's word is good I think. I saw an apple tree in R. B. Driver's door yard that had matured on promises. These promises had been made during the long years while the people hoped for water on the Wapinitia Plains but failed to get any. The effort of the farmers and prior pioneer companies only indicated that there existed a desire and a demand for water that flowed into the sea. But Driver's apple tree failed to yield any fruit because the promise of moisture had failed. Some of the sister trees died and gave up the struggle against the summer sun because they found no water to quench their burning thirst. But listen, this tree that I saw in Driver's yard held desperately on to the life that God gave it and one day a little stream was harnessed and led through the canal for 29 miles to the door yard of the Driver home. This was in 1918. The tree drank and drank and grew fresh and crisp. This year its deep green leaves shone in the sun unafraid of heat. The spring time rolled around and blossoms crowned the tree like a gray haired mother's benediction to her son. Just before the Tygh Fair this tree was laden beneath a wealth of glorious fruit second to nothing on the Pacific slope; \$25.00 worth of apples and more in one season as a tribute to

the rain maker's science. Ask R. B. Driver.

A word about 'Fresno Scrapers'. A number of farmers and prospective water users have ordered their Fresno scrapers through N. G. Hedlin. In large numbers the scrapers may be purchased now at a saving of \$4.00 to \$6.50 depending on the number. The increased demand for construction equipment has depleted the stocks of many machinery houses and orders would not be taken for present prices as 90 days or more would elapse awaiting future deliveries.
