Solid Facts 4

Leveling land properly now is true economy because it saves time and expense in irrigating next summer when time is valuable and labor scarce. Send today for "Farmer's Bulletin 865, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington D. C." This booklet is free for the asking and is worth \$1 to you Mr. Farmer. I know the ditch men will furnish you the title and No. to many farmers' pamphlets that are free and very valuable if you apply for them.

"Leveling land" does not mean to reduce surface to flat plane, but requires the removing of knolls and filling of depressions so that water may be conveyed by use of rills or "corrugations" over a uniform surface, which may have a controlling slope or grade, yet be in good irrigation condition. Frequently I hear men say, "My land is so smooth that I don't need to level it. Seldom is this really true. Better aid nature a little by hitching four horses to your home made box drag and polish up your land in proper shape. It will pay big."

The cost of land preparation varies from \$2.50 per acre to \$100. Did you ever visit a timber clearing and see the workman blow and grub the stumps and fill the holes at \$70 to \$100 per acre? Such work is continuously being done. To finish on land with a box drag will cost approximately \$2.50. Choose a good uniform plot and drag it at least. Ask Dodge or Hedin to take a look at it before you sow your wheat or alfalfa. Try for a maximum crop. If you select a smooth field you may make your head ditch and rills quickly and cheaply. You will obtain a uniform moisture distribution and not lose your water or flood your land. The proper application of water to crops is the highest paying business any farmer can engage in, but it properly relates back first to the preparation of the land and that brings most of us up to the point that confronts just now.

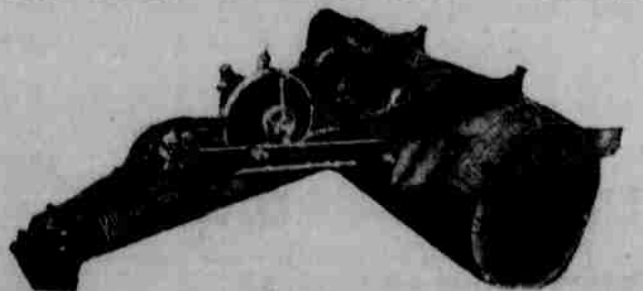
Your ditches, laterals, corrugations, water boxes, seed collection and "water duty" will all be taken up in their proper turn but first lets all get our land in ship shape. Near Grand Junction, Colo. a 50,000 acre project has been completed by the Government. A roller crest type dam 500 feet long with electrically propelled head gates—a 7292 foot tunnel through the mountain to the main canal 70 miles long—are among the engineering problems of this great system. Five years time and \$5,000,000 or \$100 per acre first cost are the staggering figures. Uncle Sam says even this will pay. What about our own favored Wapinitia Plains? Has the Bountiful Provider made our system too easy and therefore do we spurn our own while others struggle to divest the life giving waters?

I can picture the fatted cattle of a thousand fields feeding upon winter forage we can grow. I see the great security to crops that it spells and the increased demand for farms it will create. Are we really alive Mr. Farmer? Let's fill that silo and haystack and let's boost our district to the world S. C.

Good Teeth--- Good Health

More teeth are lost through loosening of the tissues that hold them in place, than through decay. One of the chief reasons for this loss is that most people look for decay of their teeth, and never notice the condition of their gums. Your gums should be firm and hard. If your gums bleed when you brush them, if they are sensitive—if you have loose or "tender" teeth, if certain foods set your teeth "on edge", these are all danger signals of pyorrhea. Bad breath is another symptom of this unhealthy condition of the gums, and a most annoying one. These symptoms of the gums are generally less painful than a decayed tooth, yet they are more dangerous to the general health.

What is Man?

A man weighing 150 pounds approximately contains 3,500 cubic feet of gas, oxygen, hydrogen and nitrogen, in his constitution, which at 80 cents per thousand cubic feet would be worth \$2,80 for illuminating purposes. He also contains all the necessary fats to make a 15-pound candle and thus, with his 3,500 cubic feet of gases, he possesses great illuminating possibilities. His system contains 22 pounds and 10 ounces of carbon or enough to make 780 dozen or 9360 lead pencils. There is about grains of iron in his blood and the rest of the body would make one spike large enough to hold his weight. A healthy man contains 54 ounces of phosphorus. This deadly poison would make 800,000 matches or enough poison to kill 500 persons. This with two pounds of lime make the stiff bones and brains. No matter how sour a man looks he contains about 60 lumps of sugar of the ordinary cubical dimensions, and to make the seasoning complete must be added 20 spoonfuls of salt. If a man were distilled into water he would make about 38 quarts or more than half his entire weight. He also contains a great deal of starch, chloride of potash, magnesium, sulphur and hydrochloric acid in his system.
