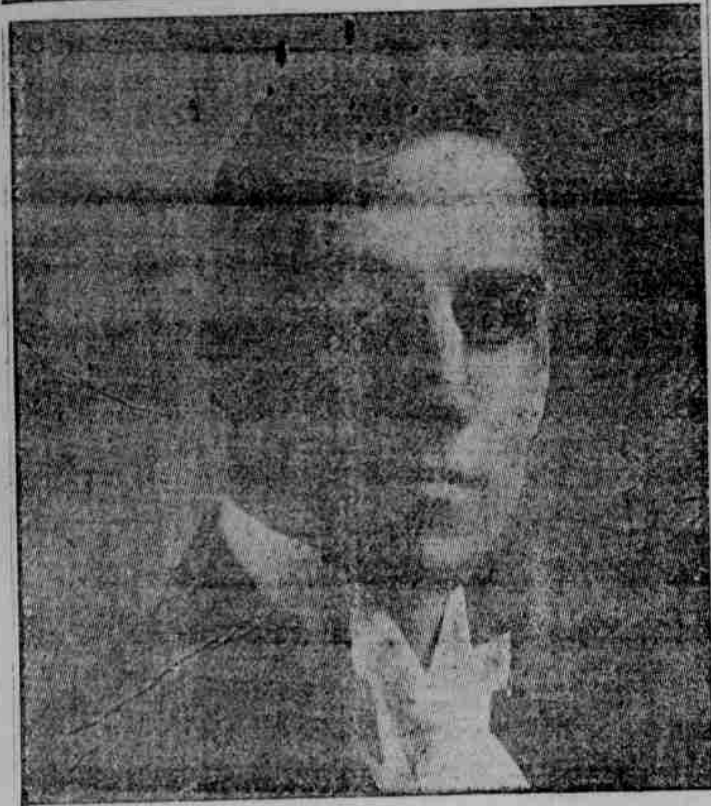


PROMINENT WELSH TENOR COMING
