The Commercial Club meeting at the school house Saturday night was pretty well attended and proved very interesting. A short program was rendered. County Agent Fluharty and State Supt. of agents Ballard were present, the latter discussing farm bureau work in the different parts of the state. The Club agreed to adopt the work of the Farm Bureau.

Mr. Fluharty outlined the work and project committee chairman were chosen. Standardization of cattle in this section was discussed freely, showing the advantages of having some good standard breed and all working to that line instead of all breeds being turned on the range together. Joe O'Brien is chairman of this project. Best methods of growing alfalfa, sweet clover and other legumes, N. G. Hedlin. The need of silos and heat crop to fill them. Len Wilson will have charge of this experiment. Best methods of irrigation for this section will be tried out by J. S. Brown. Need for fine seed wheat is also felt here and Jack Kelly will work along that line. Squirrel poisoning will be looked after by Mr. Woodside.
