Grain Grading Circus

Coming to Maupin, June 3, 1920 The Federal Grain Supervision "grain grading circus" of the Bureau of Markets, United States Department of Agriculture, is spending the month of June in Eastern Oregon and will make several one-day stops in Wasco county. Right now, before the 1920 harvest season begins, a fine opportunity is offered to learn about the federal grain standards and their correct application.

Yes, the federal grades for wheat, shelled corn and oats are still effective. Two representatives from the Portland Federal Grain Supervision office will be in charge of these one-day meetings, bringing standardized equipment with them. Every wheat grower is urged to attend. Performance starts at 1 p. m.
