Dr. Shannon Dead

In the death of Dr. Harry P. Shannon of Tygh Valley Wasco county loses one of its most honorable and highly esteemed citizens.

Dr. Shannon came to Wasco county in 1914, first locating in The Dalles, afterward taking over Dr. Elwood's practise at Tygh Valley.

Although a young man and of few years' experience the doctor showed great ability in the practise of medicine and his business methods and genial ways made many friends among the people with whom he associated.

Dr. Shannon's failure in health started during the influenza epidemic in 1918, and although he has tended to his practise during this time his health has gradually failed him until the last.

Dr. Shannon died at his home in Tygh Valley June 28th. Funeral services under the auspices of the Odd Fellows lodge were held at Crandall Undertaking parlors at The Dalles, Wednesday afternoon, June 30th. The burial took place in Odd Fellows cemetery.
