Timber Notes

V. C. Sheldon of Ohio, has recently taken a position with the Wapinitia Irrigation Co. Frog creek.

Geo. Burdette and family have moved to Cedar Post camp and working on Frog creek canal.

Wm. Hickey and wife made a lying business trip to Portland from Pine Grove, Saturday and Sunday.

Mr. Fluharty and family have moved into the company's new house at Pine Grove. He is working in the mountains on canal feeders.

Bone Woodhouse and six other Portland men are working on Frog creek canal doing powder work, team and slip work under W. A. Lane foreman.

W. B. Keen is building a half way cabin at Long trough to serve as a base or headquarters for canal repair and enlargement of main canal.

Chester, Rice has returned to Frog creek camp where he is falling timber for the Irrigation Co. Noah Flinn and family reported 190 fish catch at Clear lake last week.

Trapper Wu, Moore is planning a base for his wireless operation at Mt. Jefferson. Tom Kiksel is also to trap near this year.

E. H. Miller, general manager

and wife came up Sunday via the highway in his Old's 8 car. Mrs. Miller's eyes were causing her much distress but are much better.

Mrs. Mary Fehelke and headquarters camp for Joe Graham's road crew of forest rangers left the Bear creek camp for Beaver swamp camp last week. The new road is now partly being used by autos.

About 50 cars have visited Clear lake fishing and practically all have made catches.

Jack Kelly report his crew doing good work. They now have extended the lateral and main canal to the Pierce and Jackson ranches east of Dee Talcott's and John Confer's places. Water is flowing in overflowing measure in all the canals on the flat and also wasting in White river and the Deschutes. W. B. Keen and crew have repaired a great many leaks between Camas and the 'Cut', saving a valuable amount of water.

Engineering has been done to determine the grades for the south hill canal through Ed Davis, Fred Laughlin, O. Brenner, etc., east to the Natural Pasture on Gabel's land. The farmers are all pledged to active financial support of the work and speedy progress will be made to put the south hill canal through this summer. The new ridge canal from the cut via Walkers to U. S. Enderby's and J. Shaffin's farms and others is also being surveyed as these farmers have requested this main lateral for some months. The canal work generally is receiving quite a boost by the added and renewed support of all the districts, so the company's management is now more than anxious to crowd the mountain work to the limit during the good days. The working day has been extended to 9 hours with \$5.40 per day as a minimum in the mountains.

Many farmers are planning to visit the feeder and upper canal intake on the 4th of July and go in on the 5th to Clear lake for a good mess of trout. It is promised that the expert anglers will supply all the visitors with a good fry.

Robert Ellinwood, superintendent of the general system, is about as busy as a cranberry merchant these days.

J. S. Brown has laid the foundation for an apairy of Italian honey bees equal to that of the large aparies in California. Buck wheat and alfalfa together with the mountain oaks will form the bee pasture that will insure 10 to 100 pounds per hive per season.

O. S. Walters leaser of the Brown alfalfa and timothy ranches has cut and put up his first cutting. Chas. Cox has also stored away a fine lot of alfalfa as insurance for his cattle next winter.

Geo. Claymier has cut his first alfalfa crop this season. This cutting will average 1.1-2 tons per acre. The present price is about \$35 per ton.

Every farmer should take the time to examine his crops and choose something of special worth to save for the Tygh Fair exhibit this fall in September. We have the grain, grass, fruit and garden crops to make a real exhibit and we must do our share to properly advise our plains to all the visitors from other districts. Mr. Fluharty will have charge of the plain's exhibits so get in touch with him about your exhibits.
