Obituary

Lucertia J. Parrish was born in Illinois on the 11 day of May, 1839, and died near Wamic, Oregon, on June 27, 1920. She was 81 years, one month and 17 days of age at the time of her death. She was married to W. H. Farlow January 26, 1860 and crossed the plains with her husband in 1864, arriving in Nebraska in the fall of that year. After four years they removed to Marion county, Oregon, afterward to Clackamas county where they resided for 16 years, and then to Wasco county where she lived till her death. There were eight children born to them of whom four sons survive her, T. E. Farlow, J. M. Farlow, J. W. Farlow, and C. N. Farlow, all of Wamic, Oregon. Her only living brother, T. I. Parrish lives at Oregon City. Funeral services were conducted at the Farlow home on June 29 by Rev. G. R. Eads, pastor of the Wamic Baptist church of which she had been a member for many years.
