Distillate Here

Maupin's share of the 50,000 gallons of distillate secured by the county agent for harvest use arrived last week and has been nearly all distributed. The big tank car holding 8,100 gallons was spotted near the Hunts Ferry warehouse and the distillate was run directly into drums and tanks by gravity. This is the fourth car to arrive in the county. Lack of storage space hindered unloading the car and as a result there is still some left. Those desiring it may still secure it if they see about it at once. The original cost price was 24 cents per gallon. This week it is being sold for 24 1/2 cents, the increase being necessary to take care of demurrage.
