Received the postoffice notice you sent me. Elmer's address is 609-13th St., Sacramento, Cal. I think that he will be here with me some time in October. I got him to buy a 20-acre ranch. It is 2 1-2 miles west of Sheridan, so we will be ranching it next year.

Well I am just fine and dandy; have plenty to eat as I have a dandy garden. I have a ten gallon keg almost full of cucumber pickles. Canned some peas and apples; will have my own potatoes and will not have to buy any; have a dandy patch of tomatoes, the best that I have seen around here. My house rent only costs me \$8 per month and two lots with it and I have them in potatoes and beans. Water only costs me 75 cents per month and just as good as the Maupin water.

I am working with a hay baler; will finish this coming week and the next job will be hop picking, and from that will hop into prune

WHEAT COMING WOOL SHIPPING

The present is the season for lively business for the local grain warehouses as they are reaping in the big crops of wheat grown on the farms of this section and large surrounding territory.

"The wheat coming in is of very good quality," stated Manager W. C. Bolton of the Hunts Ferry, and holding out even better in many instances than had been expected.

Manager W. O. Miller reports the Maupin Co's. intake to ratio about two-thirds sack grain. While the main warehouse is about filled, the spacious basement may yet be used.

The official reports of grain tests made some time ago by Mr. Bolton and Mr. Miller some time ago have arrived and show their tests 100 per cent correct.

A few of the farmers have all their grain in, many are yet hauling and a number have not commenced. Threshing is still in operation on a number of farms.

While many teams and wagons are employed, the use of trucks has become quite popular.

Two carloads of wool were billed from the Hunts Ferry for Boston yesterday.
