LAST PIONEER OF WAMIC DEAD

Tommy Norval died yesterday morning at the Willis Norval home. He was 82 years old. He has resided here many years and is well known throughout the country, being an old time resident of this place and Tygh Valley. He is the last one of the early settlers here. He has been a very strong man in spite of his advanced age until the past year or two since which his strength has been failing. He leaves a sister, Mrs. Mary Jane Swift of Astoria, a son Willie Norval, three grandsons, Willis, Vard and Vernie, one granddaughter, Mrs. Lillie Fraley of The Dalles, and eight great grandchildren. The funeral was held at one o'clock today in the church, Rev. G. E. Wood conducting the services. Many attended the funeral and many pretty flowers were draped about the casket at the church and placed later on the grave.
