Military Wins

Sergeant Morris Fisher of the U. S. Marines using the U. S. magazine rifle won the 300 meter Free Rifle Match at the Olympic Shoot at Antwerp Belgium.

His score of 996 out of a possible 1080 was 7 points over that of his nearest rival, Larsen, of Denmark.

In this event the use of any type or pattern of rifle is permissible, with no restrictions as to telescopic sights, special barrels and other accessories which make for accuracy. Fisher's performance marks the first time this match has ever been won with the standard military rifle of any country, and also the first time the match has been won by a member of an American team.
