The European Relief Council, of which Herbert Hoover is chairman, has set as Oregon's quota of the European Child Feeding Fund, \$250,000.00

The stories of undernourishment and undevelopment that are told are inconceivable in their horror just as the results of ignoring the condition now will be inconceivable in terror a dozen years and more hence. The world cannot afford for its own protection to lay aside for the moment the touching character of the appeal and let such a degenerate evolution proceed."

**Express Re-established**

The latter part of last week Mr. Hall, Route Agent, for the American Railway Express Co., was in Maupin and opened an express agency at the Oregon Trunk Depot. Prior to the Great War, The American Express Co. operated an express office at this station, while the Wells Fargo covered the O. W. R. & N. lines. Besides these two companies there were six others engaged in the express business. On July 1st 1918 all eight companies were consolidated into one great corporation known as the American Railway Express Co. with thousands of offices in the United States, Canada and Mexico. Parcels can also be sent thru this company to any point of habitation in the known world. Therefore as will readily be seen the object of opening an Express office at the Oregon Trunk, is not one of competition, but solely with a view to giving the public better service. The City of Maupin will now enjoy four express trains daily instead of two as has been the case since as a war measure the Oregon Trunk Office was closed.
