NOTICE OF CONTEST

U. S. Land Office at The Dalles, Oregon, January 10, 1921.
To Jerome S. Gwynn of Wapinitia, Oregon, Contestee:
You are hereby notified that Stillman H. Goodenough who gives Wapinitia, Oregon, as his postoffice address, did on December 27, 1920, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your homestead Serial No. 025617, made March 23, 1919, for S1-28W1-4, Section 4, Township 1 south, Range 12 east, Willamette Meridian and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said Jerome S. Gwynn has not been on the land for fourteen months and he is not in the military or naval service of the United States.

You are therefore further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be cancelled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within 20 days from the FOURTH publication of this notice as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer or the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.

Obituary

Wm. Breen, a shepherd of this section for the last 20 years was found dead January 6th, near Deep creep in the Criterion section about 15 miles east of here. Mr. Breen had been in Maupin a few days before and became ill before reaching home.

Deputy Coroner Morgan with a party of local men went to the scene Friday morning arriving here with the corpse at 1:30 in the afternoon.

Mr. Breen was supposed to be about 50 years of age and a native of Germany. Little is known of him. He had been in the employ of Conroy Bros., large sheep owners of this section, and had a check for \$181 in his pocket when found. A sister is said to be living in California. Interment was made Saturday afternoon in the Kelly cemetery.
