School Notes

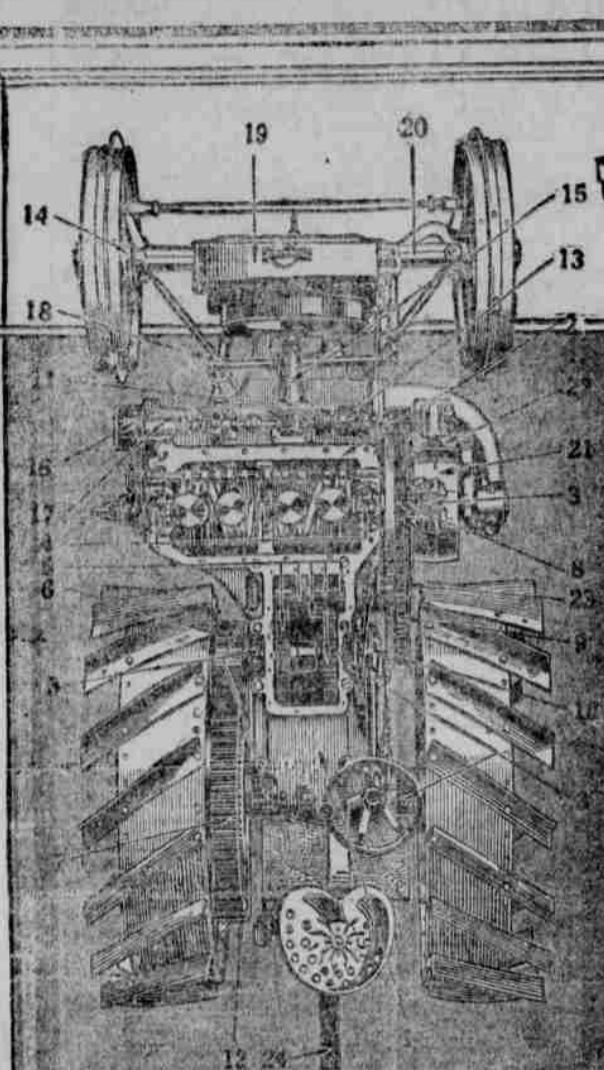
Examinations are taking place in the high school room this Thursday and Friday.

The attendance and interest of the school have been very good, almost exceptional, during the year so far, and we wish the most hearty cooperation of the parents and patrons, even to increase this attendance and interest for the remaining part of the term. With reasonably good footing, this tractor delivers a constant pull of 3,600 pounds at the drawbar. Its reserve power makes it possible to deliver 3,600 pounds pull, or over. Compare this reserve with others of similar rating.

At belt work, this tractor will drive a Case 25x45 Thrasher, with wind-stacker and feeder, or other machinery requiring similar power. Its 4-cylinder, valve-in-head motor, governor controlled, delivers a steady flow of power.

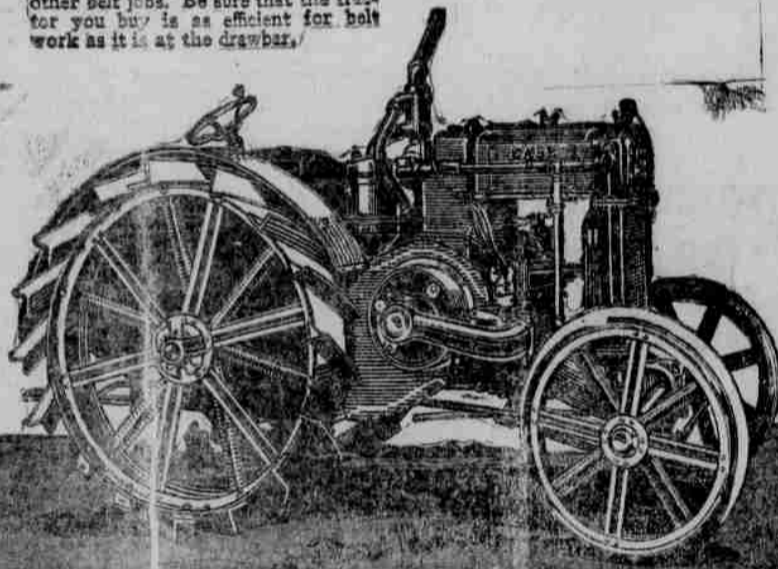
