## Alfalfa Seed

All farmers who desire alfalfa seed for 1921 should without delay, write to county agent Jackman, Court House The Dalles Oregon. Ask for certified Grimm seed as the value of uniform certified seed will be greatly appreciated in a few years when seed is marketed from Wapinitia Plains acres. Seed crops are often valued at more than hay cuttings and the world is short of certified Grimm alfalfa seed as well as all other kinds of certified seed just because planters are careless in seed selection and fail to apply the good business sense that they really should. Not only is certified seed in demand but it brings 20 to 60 per cent more than common or mixed seed when sown.

Grimm alfalfa is a strain of alfalfa that has resulted from careful selection for over a generation of the hardy, surviving plants that have withstood the frosts of winter and by careful cultivation, actually out crops

the cull, indifferent kinds of Common, Turkey and Dryland varieties.

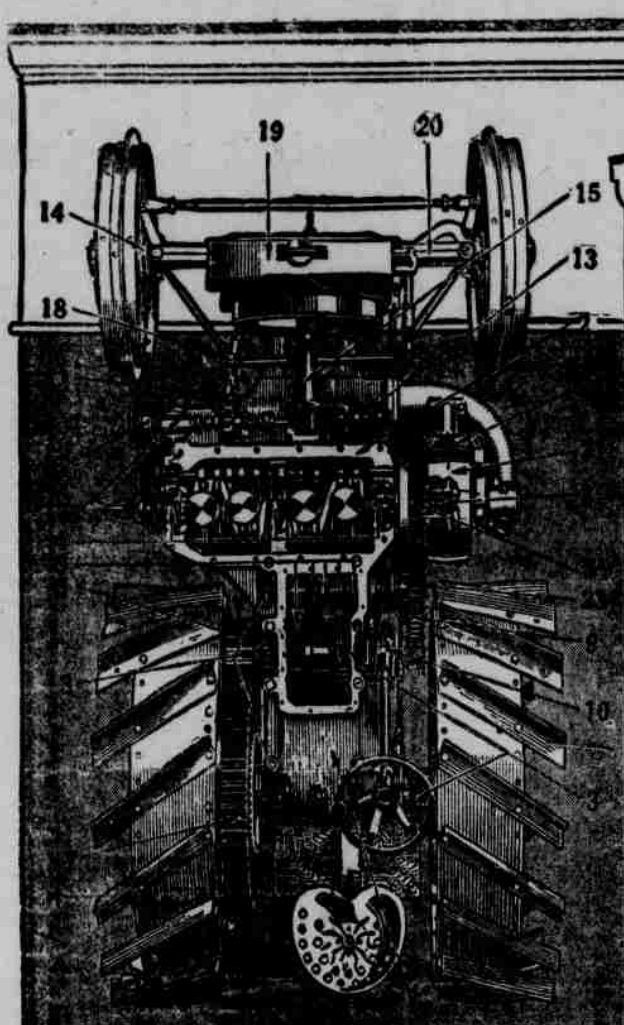
At Redmond and Bend carloads of sulphur are used each season on the alfalfa land as sulphur is cheap and brings in high interest rates for money spent in carefully checked test cases.

Alfalfa on Wapinitia Plains can be safely sown from April first to May 20. The best time is perhaps April 20th. Few farmers realize that they are actually starting a new growing bank account when they take to the alfalfa idea seriously, of all the world's forage crops "Alfalfa is King".

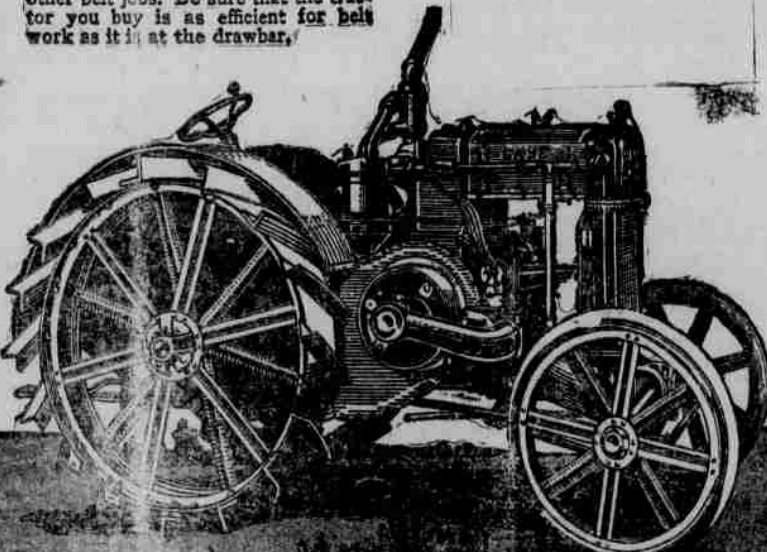
