DAIRY HINTS

MILK RECORDS AID DAIRYMAN
Both Profitable and Practicable to Know for Certainty the Full Value of Cows.

Reports coming to the United States Department of Agriculture often include stories of the surprises which cow owners meet with when they start keeping records of their cows' production. For instance, in a Missouri cow-testing association there was a man who, when he entered the association, did not appear to have a very good

herd; but among his cows was a crippled, ten-year-old Jersey named Goldie. Old Goldie led the whole association, with an annual production of approximately 9,300 pounds of milk and 625 pounds of fat, and an income over cost of feed amounting to \$267. In spite of the fact that when the test started she had already gone three months since freshening. The amusing part of Goldie's record is that her owner tried to sell her just before she went on test, for \$75. Six months later he refused \$275 for her.

The whole herd of which Goldie was a part averaged over 300 pounds of fat for the year. In contrast with this was another herd of 37 cows in the same association, which had been reputed to be the best in that part of the state. Yet 14 of these were sold during the year as unprofitable, and it seemed likely that more of them would be.

Similar stories come from other states. The dairy division has been giving a great deal of time to the extension of cow-testing associations throughout the country, and there are now nearly 500 associations in various states.

The man who joins a cow-testing association never runs the risk of selling a \$200 milk producer for \$80 because her appearance is poor, nor of wasting his feedstuffs and work on a good-for-nothing cow because she looks like a good milkier.

It is both profitable and practicable to know for a certainty the worth of a cow by weighing her milk. A man in a cow-testing association has the milk of every cow weighed and tested once a month, from which it is easy to calculate the total for a year. He saves the trouble of doing it himself by having the cow tester do it. The tester also weighs the feed, and figures out the cost of the milk; so that at the end of a year the owner of a herd of cows knows exactly what each one has given, what she has eaten, and how much income over cost of feed she has brought him.

Acres of Alfalfa.
There is an encouraging interest in increasing the acres of alfalfa on the well-adapted soils in the Middle West.

A good location for the incubator means that it should be convenient for the caretaker as well as suitably located for good hatching conditions.

In feeding young ducks, a handful of clean sand should be mixed with every half bucket of soft feed. It is also a good thing for old stock.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Dallas.—A contract has been let by the city council to Field & Housh of Portland for the paving of 19 blocks of streets. The paving will be of concrete and is to be completed within four months.

Salem.—Petitions were filed with County Judge Bushey here urging that the county court call a special election to ascertain the sentiment of the voters with relation to the employment of a county health nurse.

Newport.—At the June election Lincoln county will vote on a bond issue of \$343,240 to complete the main highway from Newport to the Benton county line, build a piece of road from Alsea to Waldport and a stretch from Tillamook county line to Siletz bay.

Nyssa.—Mining men of Homestead are taking great interest in the development of the Red Ledge mine, 20 miles down the river. A company has been running diamond drills on the property for months and it is estimated that they have more than \$30,000,000 worth of ore blocked out.

Roseburg.—An expenditure of \$68,350 on 45 different improvements comprises Douglas county's market road program which has been approved by the state engineer. The Douglas county court in outlining its plans endeavor to include all localities. The program calls for work on one-half of the projects this year.

Salem.—A. T. Mercier, superintendent of the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, has notified Fred A. Williams, chairman of the Oregon public service commission, that the railroad corporation will immediately start the installation of an automatic interlocking block system on the west side electric line operated by that company.

Salem.—The 1921 wheat crop in Marion county will be the largest for many years, provided the rains cease within the next few days, according to reports received in Salem from growers. The stand of winter wheat is exceptionally promising, but is now at a stage where the warmth of the sun is required to further its development.

Salem.—Receipts from the operation of the Oregon inheritance tax law have increased from approximately \$8000 for the biennium of 1903-04, immediately following inception of the act, to \$594,000 for the biennial period of 1919-20, according to a report prepared by O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, whom the law puts in charge of the collection of this revenue.

Prizes numbering 120 and amounting to \$1906 in cash value will be awarded to livestock club members exhibiting winning animals at the Oregon State fair in September, according to announcement by L. J. Allen, state livestock club leader at the Oregon Agricultural college. Twenty-seven trips to the college boys' and girls' summer session of two weeks with all expenses paid constitute first prizes.

Salem.—Further reductions in the price of gas furnished by the Portland Gas & Coke company will be ordered by the Oregon public service commission in a schedule to be prepared by the state department within the next few days, according to a letter sent to officials of the fuel corporation Friday. It was estimated by engineers of the public service commission that under the proposed new charges the consumers of gas will save approximately \$225,000 annually.

Salem.—Bids for the improvement and construction of approximately 54 miles of state road, at a cost estimated at \$2,200,000 will be opened at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland May 27. These bids will include contracts for the Mount Hood loop, a small section of the Roosevelt highway and the Agate-Trail section of the Crater Lake highway. Roy Klein, secretary of the highway commission, stated that every effort would be made to complete most of the proposed improvements this year. In only a few instances, will the contractors be allowed to continue the work into next year, he said.

Salem.—June 7 the voters of Oregon will go to the polls and pass judgment on five statewide measures, three of which, if approved, will amend the state constitution. All of these measures were referred to the voters at the 1921 session of the legislature. The five measures are: Enabling the governor to veto emergency clause on legislative measures without impairing remaining sections of the act. Compulsory marriage examination and license bill. Providing for lengthening sessions of the legislature and increasing the compensation of legislators. Qualifying women to sit as jurors. Creating world war veterans' state aid fund and providing choice of cash bonus or \$15 a month or loan in sums not to exceed \$4000.

Movement On to Bar German-Made Films

New York.—Movements are under way here to bar the further importation of motion pictures made in Germany, either by tariff legislation or other means. Agitation against the German films was started in the American Legion, the report of which led Major Cornelius W. Wickersham, one of the officials of the legion, to state he would present the matter to the American committee.

Independent producers, led by John Emerson, both as movie director and as president of the Actors' Equity association, prepared to appeal to congress for protection against the films, and the equity will back the movement as a safeguard against the throwing out of employment of American movie actors. The Motion Picture Directors' association held a meeting to consider opposition to such importations, which the film makers declare will ruin the home industry if persisted in.
