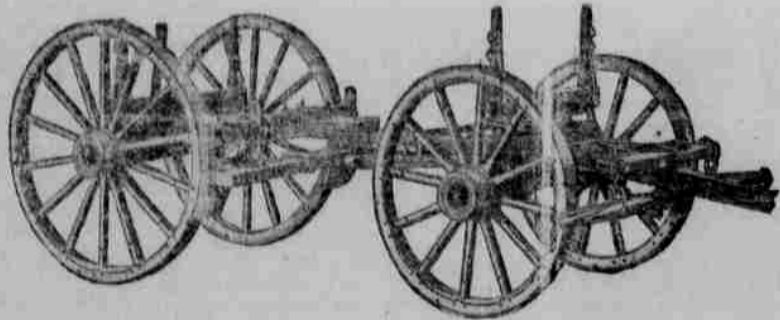

Winona Wagons



"Good Timber and Bone Dry"

Hickory and oak are used as the foundation for Winona Wagons. These timbers are bought green and air cured from three to five years at the factory. All wood used in Winona Wagons is heavy, strong and tough.

Sufficient iron and steel is used on these wagons to protect all places subject to wear and tear and of proper size to withstand, without injury, all ordinary strain to which the wagon may be subjected.

Outer bearing axles add material strength to these wagon gears.

The felcos on Winona Wagons are made of two pieces of oak bent green and riveted to prevent splitting. The ends of the felcos cannot crack off as the grain of the wood follows the curve of the wheel.
