How Many Days Per Year Should a Tractor Work To Be a Profitable Investment?

Questions Asked Dealers By Farmers

The number of working days for an advanced tractor like the Case 10-18 is rapidly increasing. Twenty-six years ago when the first began to build motor tractors, men thought of plowing with a tractor. But war-time conditions have brought about changes not only in the mechanical development of tractors, but in their adaptation to multiplied uses.

More Ways to Use Case Tractors

Nowadays many farmers attain as high as 200 days' use per year, although the average, of course, is considerably less. The small highly developed Case tractor, the 10-18 is purposely designed for maximum use. It is adaptable for all kinds of work. It represents years of study in the field, dozens of exhaustive investigations. We have found that 9 out of 10 men consider plowing ability of first rank, then come plowing, harrowing and harvesting, but work, shelling, shredding and seed, grinding, harvesting, road work, threshing, hauling, mowing, cutting feed and silo filling, haying, spraying, planting and seeding, and stump pulling.

The above uses are stated in their relative importance as tabulated in a recent investigation. The same investigation discloses that a tractor spends 63.4-7 per cent of its time in the field and 35.3-7 per cent on the belt.

Ever Ready

The Case 10-18 is small and compact. It weighs little more than a team of horses. Its length is 102 inches, width 55 inches and height 54 1/2 inches. It turns in a 22-foot circle, and can get around easily. It goes through a small gate or door and easily shares the road with other vehicles.

While rated at 10 horsepower on the drawbar, it develops nearly 14. While rated at 18 on the belt, it develops up to 24. Thus one has the assurance that it is ever ready for an emergency.

There are dozens of improvements in this Case 10-18. For instance, it has a one-piece main frame, with a four-cylinder engine mounted crosswise. This frame construction affords a dust-proof housing for the rear axle, ball pinion shaft, transmission and the bearings for these parts. It also provides a base for the motor.

This type of construction brings rigidity. It minimizes vibration and prevents disengagement of gears, which are all cut and fully enclosed. Thus we multiply strength, reduce weight and conserve power.

Greater Economy

Another feature is its economical consumption of horsepower. It has a Case 10-18 plan that controls the fuel supply system and further simplifies the use of horsepower. And it has a new fuel pump passing by three times and diluting oil in the crank case.
