The primary room is taught by Miss Annie Hallyburton, and consists of the first four grades. The first week in this room was given entirely to reviewing with the result that during the second week successful classwork is being done. The little folks under the direction of this teacher are making this room very beautiful and attractive. Flower boxes have been made for the windows. Borders, which illustrate the fairy stories, have been made for the black boards and new pictures, suitable for primary rooms, have been added. These folks are very happy in their work.

The intermediate room, under the supervision of Miss Jessie B. Aiken, reports excellent progress. These pupils are very happy in their work and thoroughly enjoy it. In addition to installing flower boxes in their windows and otherwise making the room attractive, they have organized a literary society which meets each Friday afternoon. One period of Friday afternoon is given over

to greater effort.

We of the high school are more than happy in our work. We are doing school work which is real. We are earning every step of our way. Our room is one in which the principles of self government are successfully exemplified. Everyone does as he pleases, and pleases to do what is right to do, not because he must, but rather because it is the thing to do. Thus we are acquiring those habits which will make us truly good citizens. Our teacher tells us that the aim of education is to make right habits automatic. He says that "right habits" will be our best friends in life and it is these habits we are striving to acquire. Already we are realizing the tremendous energizing power of self denial and self restraint.
