Wapinitia School

School opened September 12 with 54 pupils, increased to 56; 30 boys and 24 girls.

Twenty-four pupils were not absent or tardy during month.

Enrollment of eight, increased to thirteen. Mrs. Barrox arrived Saturday, taking up her duties as teacher of the high school, Monday, October 10.

The high school is using the old school house across the street from the grade school. Blackboards and new desks have been installed and the interior has been generally rearranged.
