More Prizes

Girls and boys in classes at school, and the members of Girls and Boys Clubs throughout the Pacific Northwest, will be interested in the inducements offered them to display their processed and preserved fruits, put up in school or at home, at the Pacific Northwest Fruit Exposition, to held in Seattle, Nov. 21 to 26.

In the high school contest prizes are offered for the best display of processed fruits, put up in school, to contain the following: 10 quarts of canned fruits, not less than five varieties; 10 glasses of jelly, not less than three varieties; 10 glasses preserved fruits; 10 glasses of jams and marmalades; 5 glasses of conserve; 5 glasses spiced and pickled fruits. The prizes will be, first \$50; second \$25; third \$15.

In the contest for Girls and Boys Clubs, the same kind and variety of a display is called for, with premiums as follows: First, \$50; second, \$25; third, \$15; fourth, \$10, and fifth, \$5.
