**DIFFERENT PAVEMENT COSTS** Figures Given on Various Kinds of Surfacings Used in Test Made in Pennsylvania.

The costs of various kinds of surfacings on 3.41 miles of road forming part of a test road built in 1912-1913 by the bureau of highways, Philadelphia, are now available. Twenty-six sections were laid, of which six were bituminous macadam mixed method, eight bituminous penetration macadam, five of concrete base with a bituminous top, seven vitrified brick, says Engineering News-Record. Averaging the first cost, interest at 4 per cent for seven years, and the maintenance, the total cost January 1, 1920, was \$1,7738 per square yard for bituminous macadam penetration sections, as compared with \$2,0776 for bituminous mixed method macadam, \$3,0000 for concrete, and \$5,5109 for brick.
