John I. West was born in Yamhili county, Oregon, Janu ary 6, 1861, completed this life at his home two miles west of Wapinitia, March 3, having at tained the age of 61 years, 1 month and 27 days.

Mr. West's parents were among the first settlers in the Oregon country. When four year's old his mother died At that time Mr. and Mrs. Johnson Basket became his foster parents and le made his home with them until he was eighteen years of age. It was then that he came to Wasco county and ngaged in farming and stock raising near Wapinitia where he esided continuously ever since. in marriage to Miss Anna N. Horton, formerly of Indiana, o this union were born two children. Ishom aged 19 years, and Anna aged 14. Mrs. West died in February, 1907.

As a citizen, friend and neighbor, Mr. West was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. In his departure our community has lost one of its most substantial members, while the son and daughter suffer a far greater loss, that of a beloved father.

The funeral services were conducted at the Kelly cemetery March 4 by the Odd Fellow's lodge of which he was a member
