

Pioneer Passes

David P. Crabtree, 77 years old, an early resident of Wasco county in the district near where the town of Maupin now stands, died last night at The Dalles hospital, after an illness of several weeks. He was a Pioneer of Oregon, coming to Linn county in 1883, from Michigan. He came to Wasco county in 1887, settling on the ranch where he lived until 1910, when the family moved to The Dalles. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary Crabtree, and three children Mrs. Albert Jackson, of Portland Mrs. Arthur Crieghton, of The Dalles, and Charles Crabtree of Antelope. The deceased was a member of the United Brethren church. Funeral services will be held Sunday at 9:30 o'clock from the Zell Funeral home. Rev. G. K. Hartman, officiating. Burial will be in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.—Chronicle, July 7.
