

Injuries Fatal

Joseph Edward Cantrell, 42 years old, who was injured when a rock car upon which he was riding at the Mill creek crusher of the United Contracting company ran away, died at The Dalles hospital Saturday night. Cantrell attempted to jump when he saw that the car was beyond control but was caught by the cable and tossed into the air, striking on his head. His skull was fractured. He was foreman of the crusher, which supplies rock for the construction of the Mill creek market road. His home was in Dufur. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock from St. Peter's Catholic church. Rev. P. J. O'Rourke officiating. The following were pallbearers: C. W. Stewart, Milton Hayworth, Ed Ball, Harvey McClain and H. C. Hurley. Burial was made in the Catholic cemetery. Cantrell is survived by his widow, Mrs. Lucille Cantrell; his father, William R.; two brothers, William S. and Richard B., and a sister, Mrs. Daisy Temple, all of Dufur.—Chronicle July, 17.

Hunting Season Changed.

A change in the open season on deer, quail, Chinese pheasants, native pheasants, grouse, sage hens and prairie chickens, in all sections of the state where there is an open season, was announced today in a communication received from the Oregon State Game commission. The new open season on deer is set from August 20 to October 31. The season on quail and Chinese pheasants, in districts where the hunting of these birds is permitted, will be from August 20 to September 20. On sage hens, the open season will be from July 15 to July 31, and on prairie chickens from October 15 to October 31. Changes in the open season in no wise affects the bag limits or other regulations provided by law, the game commission points out.—Chronicle.
