Obituary

Henry Patison committed suicide in his room at the hotel Sunday August 20th, by placing the muzzle of a 32-rifle in his mouth and pulling the trigger. Henry had been in very poor health for some time and during the past few days was failing very fast. His sisters, Mrs. Gibson and Mrs. Driver, came over from Wamic Sunday at about 1:30 and Henry insisted that they go and get something to eat and they had left the room just a few minutes when the fatal shooting took place. Monday morning the remains were taken to Wamic where the funeral services were held in the afternoon at 3:30. Henry Patison was 55 years old and as near as the editor can remember, had spent the greater part of 24 years in Grass Valley and vicinity and had many acquaintances.

Standard Oil Plant

The Standard Oil Company (California) have announced that they will, within a very short period, begin the erection of a distributing station at Maupin.

This is the most important addition to the local business institutions that has taken place in some time, and has a big bearing on the financial and commercial welfare of this city. The decision of the Standard Oil Company to establish their distributing plant here was reached only after a thorough analytical study of business conditions, and the growth of the city and the community surrounding Maupin, with a particular view to its possibilities of expansion and progress, and it expresses the Standard Oil Company's judgement and confidence in the future of this community.

It is expected that the new institution will be open for business within sixty days.

In the past Maupin and the surrounding community have been served from the Standard Oil Company's Substation at The Dalles, but the increase in the amount of business done and the demands for more thorough service in the country tributary to this city has been one of the reasons why this local station is built.

The station which the Standard Oil Company will build will consist of the necessary large storage tanks and warehouse facilities for handling the principal products of the Company, which are Pearl Oil, Red Crown Gasoline, Standard Engine Distillate, Zero line Oils and Greases, as well as the oils and greases required for industrial uses. All buildings will be constructed of corrugated iron and will be as nearly fire proof as possible. One of the features of all Standard Oil Stations is the neat appearance, as the buildings, tanks and equipment are kept painted and clean. Every precaution will be taken for fire prevention, as no smoking is permitted on or around the property, and the carrying of matches by employees and other persons entering the plant is strictly prohibited. Supplies handled in tankage are received by tank ship at the Company's Main Station at Willbridge (Portland, Oregon) direct from the Refinery at Richmond, California and will then be transported by tank car from Willbridge to Maupin.

"SERVICE" is the word adopted by the Standard Oil Company and Service is rendered by the company in every sense of the word. Special pains will be taken to supply the Red Crown Gasoline requirements of the many dealers in the district covered by this station, as well as the requirements for petroleum products of the farmers and industries in the community.

The entrance of the Standard Oil Company as a direct business in Maupin will mean a big thing for the community not only in the way of an increase in the payroll in the city but the improved service that will be possible from having a distributing plant located at Maupin.
