Veterans Attention

Wilson's have a new line of Pendleton goods.

Word was received today from C. R. Christie, special contact representative of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau that he will arrive in Maupin October 5, and Wamic October 6 for the purpose of interviewing war veterans relative to their disabilities. Mr. Christie was recently assigned by the Veterans' Bureau to contact former service people in communities outside the larger cities throughout the state.

All veterans who believe that they are entitled to government compensation, vocational training or hospital treatment, should contact Mr. Christie during the one day he will be in these cities.

Aside from taking up grievances, relative to compensation or hospitalization, Mr. Christie will give local veterans opportunity to reinstate their war risk insurance. During a campaign held in the northwest district of the Veterans' Bureau recently, more than \$500,000 worth of war risk insurance was reinstated or converted to permanent life or endowment policies. Former service people wishing to reinstate their government policies are required to pay two months premiums and undergo a physical examination, according to the contract representative. The Pacific Northwest district now leads all other sections of the United States in the amount of war risk insurance carried by its veterans, in proportion to the military population of this district, he stated.

The fairgrounds themselves are in the best of shape, according to A. A. Ponney of Tygh, who is a visitor in The Dalles today. Every bit of equipment at the fair grounds has been put in good condition and the accommodations for the large entry list in the stock exhibits have been renovated.

Plenty of room is available at the fairgrounds. The camping space can handle as many as 5000 visitors should this be found necessary. Boys and girls' clubs from throughout the county are entered for prizes in various events. They will conduct stock judging as well as place entries in the various departments.
