## To Sell Music

The eleven thousand American Legion Posts are being mobilized to distribute over two million copies of the Official National March of the organization, "Armistice Day Forever". It is composed by Berry J. Sisk, a crippled young man of Sioux City Iowa, and won its high distinction when it was adopted by the National Executive Committee of the American Legion.

This composition was first introduced by Sousa's Band and has received praise from other great musical leaders. "Armistice Day Forever" was written by Mr. Sisk in the hour when he was in thought trying to be of help to soldiers that are disabled and otherwise handicapped. He was unable to go to the front lines with them during the world war, but as he puts it, "Physical handicaps should not keep anyone from performing patriotic services. I will feel more like calling myself an American after I have paid my debt to the boys that fought for our nation in its greatest danger."

Knowing that Armistice Day was the day that ended the war and that the duties of Americans were transferred on that day to the men who won the fight, he gave the March the historical title, "Armistice Day Forever."

With this march, he intends to raise one million dollars for the Legion, to be used in the benefit of the needy veterans, and the sale and distribution will be handled by the Posts throughout the country.

Mr. Sisk, though badly handicapped since childhood has been self-reliant, is married, conducts a successful publishing business and shows a keen interest in Americanization work. He is against cripples begging and abhors unconstructive living by anyone. "Let cripples ask for an education and they will get it then let them use that education in the right way and be good citizens. The mind if properly utilized will make the handicapped individual happy and successful," is Sisk's philosophy. He not only is successful himself but instead of asking help, he has always aimed to help others and with his March he is determined to pay the ex-service men for taking his place in the uniform.

M. L. Kinney, W. E. Lucas and Jessie Lucas, covering the appropriation of water from Middle Fork and Gate creek for irrigation and supplemental supply.

H. Wood of Tvgh Valley covering the appropriation of water from Tvgh creek for irrigation of 11 acres.

F. M. Fowler of Wamic, covering the appropriation of water from Rock and Gate creeks for irrigation of 55 acres.

Exceptions of the Wamic Ditch company in the White river water right adjudication will come up for hearing in the circuit court Monday. The exception constitutes an appeal to the circuit court from the findings of the state water board. Chronicle
