Pioneers Pass

Word has just been received in The Dalles of the death at Wamic last Tuesday, of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Beaty. Mrs. Beaty was 73 years old, and of those years, 56 were spent in Oregon. Mrs. Beaty was born in Nebraska, April 15, 1849. With her husband and two eldest children, she crossed the plains in an ox train of 75 teams in 1867, six months being consumed in the journey. The family settled near Dixie, Polk county. The name of this town was later changed to Rickreall.

Here they lived for a number of years moving eventually to other parts of the Willamette valley and in 1910 to Wamic. Mrs. Beaty was the mother of 11 children, seven of whom survive. They are C. F. Campbell, San Diego; Mrs. J. S. Hanna Portland; J. D. Campbell and Mrs. J. L. Kennedy, Wamic; Mrs. W. E. Hunt, Maupin; A. J. Bales, Wamic and Mrs. Ray Reese of Bandon. Two sisters Mrs. L. J. Lawson of Fossil, Mrs. Lydia O. Kelly of Prineville and three brothers David Elliott Vancouver, B. C., John K. Elliott Eola, and M. L. Elliott, Seattle, also survive. In latter years, Mrs. Beaty's mind went back often to early days, and she never tired of telling her experiences as a pioneer in the Oregon country and crossing the plains. Chronicle, Feb. 17.

The funeral of Alfonso C. Tunison was held yesterday afternoon from the Bovee parlors and interment was made in Crystal Lake cemetery. Rev. E. J. Harper conducted the services. Pall bearers were brother members of the Moose lodge.

Mr. Tunison passed away at Redondo Beach, California, February 10 and the body brought here to be laid to rest. Some months ago Mr. and Mrs. Tunison left Corvallis and went to Redondo in hope that a change of climate might be beneficial to his failing health. He had suffered a slight paralytic stroke here and it was thought that the climate might be better for him in the south.

After arriving in California he was bothered with rheumatism and it was while being treated for this trouble that he first noticed trouble with his heart. This developed into dropsy which is given as the immediate cause of death.

Mr. Tunison had lived in this part of Oregon for the past 32 years and was counted among those who had helped make Oregon history in later years. For a long time he lived in the Kings Valley country and later moved to Corvallis where he owned property just south of Marys river.

He was a member of the L. O. O. M. and also of the G. A. R. A. C. Tunison was born in Albany, N. Y., December 7, 1850 and was in his 73d year when he passed away. His early life was

spent in Michigan and it was in that state, July, 1877, that he married Nellie M. Martin, who survives him. Two daughters were born to this union who are now Mrs. L. Beulah De Janvier of Marshfield and Mrs. Rose F. Miller of Maupin, Oregon. The daughters were present at the funeral.

In 1887 the Tunisons moved to Washington. That year Mr. Tunison suffered the loss of his right arm and later in '87 they moved to Corvallis.

In his later years he has been a farmer but he was also an ordained minister of the gospel of the Evangelical faith.

His war experience occurred in the latter part of the civil war and he enlisted when but 14 years of age as a fifer. Besides his wife and daughters he is survived by three brothers C. E. of Maupin, J. G. of Boise, Idaho and P. H., Michigan.

A lifelong friend that must be counted in the same story with the relatives is Charles Gill who for years has made his home with the Tunisons.

The many friends of this family will join in extending sympathy to them in their hour of sorrow.

Mrs. Tunison expects to return to Redondo soon. — Courier Corvallis.
