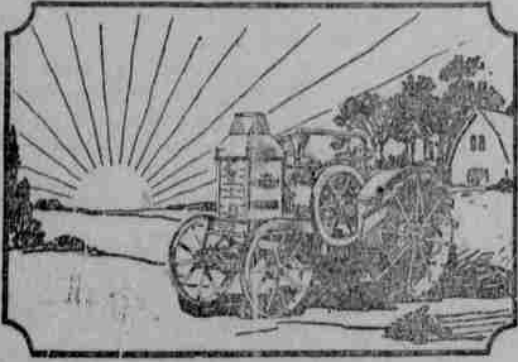

Bible Lecture Synopsis

The lectures given in the I. O. O. F. hall during the week past have been very interesting. The first lecture was given on Thursday night one week ago, the subject being, "Time prophecy and the judgment." The speaker showed from the prophecy of Daniel 9:25-27, that it was definitely stated when the Messiah would come and just when he would begin his ministry. He said that the first chapter of Mark, fifteenth verse shows that Jesus understood this prophecy, and when he started out to preach he said, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent ye and believe the gospel." This was in A. D. 27. See the date in the margin of your Bible. The rest of this prophecy of Daniel 8 and 9 reaches to A. D. 1844, when the judgment began in Heaven. The Lord will come when the judgment is over.

Friday night the text was Daniel 2:44, "And in the days of these kings shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed; and the kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever." It was shown that the dream of Nebuchadnezzar in the second chapter of Daniel represent four universal kingdoms that would rule the world from Daniel's day to the coming of the Lord and the setting up of his kingdom, represented by the stone that was cut out of the mountain and smote the image and broke it to pieces, verse 34. He went on to say that the prophecies make it plain that the time is almost up for the

everlasting kingdom of God in the earth.

Saturday night we listened to a sermon on our future home or what the kingdom will be when it is set up. We were shown from the Bible that the kingdom would be set up on this earth when it is purified by fire and made new. Proof for this is found in the promise to Abraham, Genesis 13:14-17 and Heb. 11:8-10, 39, 40. It was also made plain from Gal. 3:16 and 29, that if we are Christ's true followers we are Abraham's seed and heirs of the promise.

Sunday at eleven o'clock the subject was "The Millennium." The speaker showed from Revelation 19:11-21 and chapter 20:1-10 John 14:1-3, 1 Thes. 4:16-17, Rev 21:2 that the millennium will begin at the coming of the Lord and the first resurrection and the translation of all the righteous to heaven where they reign with Christ a thousand years, and the wicked are all dead and live not until the thousand years are fulfilled. Satan is bound on this earth at the same time and at the end of the thousand years the Holy City and all the righteous come to this earth, the wicked dead are raised and Satan and all the wicked are consumed with fire from heaven, and the saints possess the kingdom forever.

Monday night we found that Christ was not only our redeemer but also the creator and that he existed before the world was made John 17:5, and 24, Genesis 1:1, 26 and John 1:1-4 shows that Christ was with the Father in the creation of this world and that Christ was the real creator of all things, Col. 1:12-20.
