The Driver-Harvey thresher finished their season's run Tuesday noon on the A. M. Patison place.

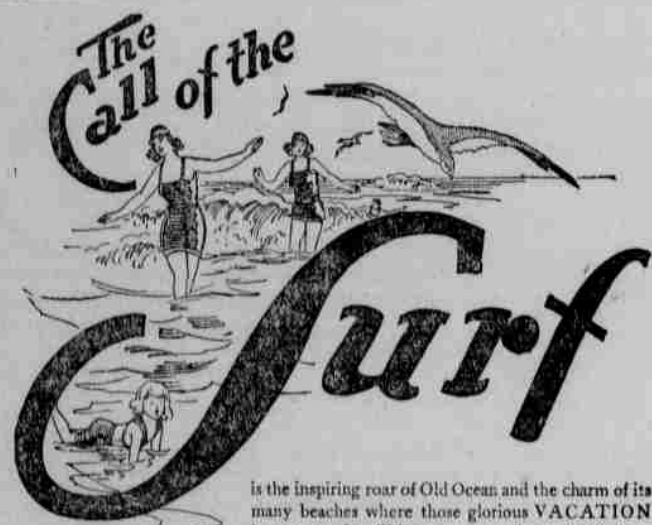
Dr. Elwood was called again Thursday to see Clifford Palmateer.
