Shaniko School Notes

To whom it may concern:
The old ball ground at Shaniko has been turned over to the high school for an athletic field. This is a level tract of about ten acres free from rocks and conveniently situated just across the railroad track from the Moody warehouse. This field compares more than favorably with any athletic field in the county not excepting even

the fair grounds at Tygh Valley. The high school boys spent all of last Saturday afternoon in marking off the foot ball ground. A suitable and convenient building has been secured for the purpose, and shower baths will be installed as quickly as the work can be done. Uniforms have been ordered and it is the plan to begin the foot ball practice in earnest and with all necessary equipment not later than the first Monday in October.

The indications now are that there will be fourteen boys and nine girls at the high school. Some of the boys are veterans of baseball and the track but only a few have had previous football training. The boys will be coached by a former University of Oregon man, who played three seasons on the Varsity team and who was a member of the first championship team the University of Oregon ever had. Those boys who love athletics will find themselves in their element at Shaniko.

A five piece orchestra has been organized and excellent progress has been made. We expect to have three additional pieces with in two weeks.

The young people at Shaniko have the right spirit and only a continuation of present activities is necessary to make this a happy and never-to-be-forgotten year in their lives.
