The Federal Land Bank of Spokane has entered suit in the circuit court against W. H. Mayfield, et ux, and the White River National Farm Loan association for the collection of a note by mortgage for \$3,200. The note was signed July 5, 1917, and there have been no semi-annual payments made since January 5, 1922, according to the complaint. The mortgage involves 280 acres of land situated in section 31, township 4, south, of range 10 east and section 6, township 5, south, range 12 east. The plaintiff complains also that to the best of belief, defendants Mayfield and the Spokane bank seeks recourse at law to obtain satisfaction of mortgage by the sale of the property. The loan is said to have been made through the association, which indorsed the note.

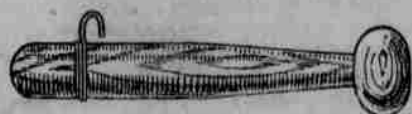

Married persons \$2000.00 Single persons \$1000.00

One percent on the first \$1000.00 above exemptions, rate raises 1-4 percent on each additional \$1000.00 to 2 percent; then raises 1-2 percent on each additional \$1000.00 to a maximum of 6 percent on all incomes of \$12,000.00 or more.

TAX EXEMPT SECURITIES:

All U. S. Securities exempt, State Securities not exempt. All dividends are subject to tax.

DATE FOR FILING RETURNS:

Returns for 1923 must be filed on or before March 30th, 1924.
