Remodeling Needed

A third teacher, to take charge of the fourth and fifth grades of the Maupin schools in now assured local patrons. This change is to begin immediately after the holidays, the back room of the public school building to be again equipped with school furniture for the purpose.

This back room is the old original school building of Maupin and is not built after practical nor modern methods of lighting school rooms, but having three windows on each side throwing a cross light on the desks of both pupils and teacher. This can be remedied with practically very little time and expense by moving the windows from one side to the end of the building which would then entitle the room to that item of standardization, which as long as it remains of the architecture debar the entire school from credit of standardization. A fresh coat of interior paint would also improve the comfort of the room, and give teacher and pupils a feeling that they are not cast away into the "back room".

EXEMPTIONS:

Married persons \$2000.00 Single persons \$1000.00

RATES:

One percent on the first \$1000.00 above exemptions, rate raises 1-4 percent on each additional \$1000.00 to 2 percent; then raises 1-2 percent on each additional \$1000.00 to a maximum of 6 percent on all incomes of \$12,000.00 or more.

TAX EXEMPT SECURITIES:

All U. S. Securities exempt, State Securities not exempt. All dividends are subject to tax.

DATE FOR FILING RETURNS:

Returns for 1923 must be filed on or before March 30th, 1924.
