ORDINANCE NO. 53

An ORDINANCE to provide for the issuance of the Town of Maupin Water Bonds in the sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500); to provide a form for said bonds and the coupons attached thereto; ratifying, approving and confirming the sale of said bonds and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, heretofore at an election duly called and held in the Town of Maupin on the 16th day of May, 1924, a charter amendment was duly adopted by the legal voters of said Town authorizing the Council of said Town to issue bonds of said Town in the sum of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purpose of procuring funds to construct and install a water system for said Town; and

WHEREAS, it now becomes necessary to provide for the issuance of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) of said bonds and a form therefore and for the coupons to be attached thereto; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MAUPIN:

Section 1. That the Town of Maupin do issue its bonds in the sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) said bonds to be in denominations of five hundred dollars (\$500) each, numbered 1 to 25 inclusive, to bear date July 1, 1924, and to mature July 1, 1944, subject to redemption, however, at the option of said Town at any semi-annual coupon date on and after July 1, 1934, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July, principal and interest to be payable in United States gold coin of the present standard value at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City, said bonds to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder under the corporate seal of said Town, and the interest on said bonds to be represented by semi-annual interest coupons attached thereto bearing the engraved facsimile signatures of said Mayor and Recorder, which said bonds shall be known as "Town of Maupin Water Bonds".

Section 2. That the said Town of Maupin Water Bonds and the coupons attached thereto shall be in substantially the following form:

FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS

on the first day of July, 1944, with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July to the bearer of the respective coupons therefor hereto attached as they mature, both principal and interest payable in United States gold coin of the present standard of value at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

The Town of Maupin hereby expressly reserves the right to redeem this bond at any semi-annual coupon period on or after July 1, 1934.

This bond is one of a series authorized and issued under and pursuant to the provisions of an amendment to the charter of said Town submitted to and approved by the legal voters thereof at an election duly called and held therein on the 16th day of May, 1924, which said amendment authorized an issue of bonds of said Town in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), for the purpose of procuring funds to construct and install a water system for said Town.

And it is hereby certified that every requirement of law relating to the issue hereof has been duly complied with and that this bond is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the constitution and laws of the State of Oregon or the charter of said Town.

And for the punctual payment of the principal hereof and the interest hereon the full faith and credit of the Town of Maupin is hereby irrevocably pledged.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the Town of Maupin has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor and countersigned by its Recorder, under the corporate seal of said Town, and the annexed coupons to bear the engraved facsimile signatures of said Mayor and Recorder this first day of July, 1924.

Section 3. The sale of the aforesaid bonds heretofore made to Rlyth, Witter & Company is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed, and the proper city officials are hereby authorized, empowered and instructed to see to the proper execution of said bonds and to the delivery thereof to said purchaser upon the payment of the purchase price therefor.

Section 4. WHEREAS, the bonds hereinabove provided for were duly authorized at an election regularly called and held for the purpose; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that funds be procured at as early a date as possible for the purpose for which said bonds are issued, thereby involving the peace, health and safety of the Town, and in order so to do it is necessary to enact this ordinance; now, therefore,

AN EMERGENCY is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall go into force and effect upon its adoption and approval. Passed by the Council this 9th day of July, 1924, by the following vote:

Unusual interest among feminine motorists has greeted the Willys-Overland announcement of its new two-passenger Overland Coupe. Not only is it a light car embodying the manifold advantages of the entire Overland line, but it combines with these a driving comfort and convenience almost incredible in a car of these dimensions.

With the male members of the family requiring the use of the car during the day, there is a definite need for a second car in a good many homes, a car that can be used for shopping and visiting by the women folks of the home.

The new Coupe has proved itself to be ideally adapted for this purpose. Ventilating windshield, Dura window regulators, rear window curtains are little touches that appeal to feminine taste.

Coupled with these features is the ease of parking, and the unusual riding comfort due to the 136-inch spring base. Its ease of handling in congested traffic areas because of the exceptionally large steering spindles and bearings are decided factors in this new car intended for feminine use.

The new coupe is equipped with doors that are over 31 inches wide, thus providing easy entrance. The body of exceptionally heavy metal, is sturdily reinforced. Unusual pains are taken with the painting operations, fourteen coats being applied to give the car its lasting durable finish.

The interior or the body is finished in durable, long grain Spanish leather upholstery. The seat cushion is over 45 inches wide, being ample to accommodate three medium-sized people. There are 15 inches between steering wheel and cushion, rendering it convenient for the car to be entered easily from either side.

A roomy rear deck provided ample space for packages, which is an additional convenience for shopping. Its hinged cover is provided with a lock and is protected against dust and leaks.
