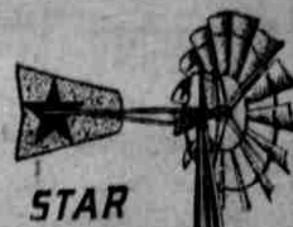
## Greene Contracts Road Job
