## Term Used by Masons

The name "Cyclopean masonry" is given to walls constructed of large, irregular, but closely fitting stones, unheated and uncemented, specimens of which may still be seen at Mycenae and Tiryns and other parts of Greece, and also in Italy. These walls were probably built by the Pelasgians, a race anterior to the Greeks and Romans, about 1000 B. C.; but later generations, struck by their vast proportions, ascribed their construction to the fabulous race of the Cyclopes, whence their name. Examples of Cyclopean masonry exist also in Sicily, Ireland, Peru and Africa.—Exchange.
