MRS. LEWIS E. WALTERS

Mrs. Walters was born in North Dakota October 2, 1890, and died at The Dalles, November 23, 1926. When but a young girl she came with her parents to Oregon, they taking up their home in the Wapinitia section. As a young girl she attended the schools of that district until she reached the age of 20 years when she was united in marriage with Lewis E. Walters.
To this union six children were born, they being: Edward, 14; Harvey, 12; Levers, 9; Lulu May, 6; Lester, 4; and Edith, 2. Besides these Mrs. Walters leaves, her husband, three sisters: Mrs. Mary Hauser of Tygh Valley; Mrs. Katie Clark and Mrs. Alta McDonald, and two brothers, Fred and Will Weber.
Funeral services were conducted at Wapinitia on Friday, last, being conducted by Rev. Everett Hazen. Interment took place at the Kelly cemetery, the remains being followed to the grave by a large concourse of sorrowing friends and neighbors.
At the time of the birth of her last baby Mrs. Walters contracted lagrippe. She was ill for a long time, but later seemed to recover her usual good health. In February last another attack of the flu overtook her. From that time she began to fail, the ailment finally developing into quick tuberculosis. She was taken to The Dalles for treatment, but such was the insidious nature of her ailment that death alone could relieve her from its tentacles.
Mrs. Walters was a woman of rare attainments. She lived with a great faith in her maker and was ready when the final summons came. As a wife and mother she was unexcelled; a hard worker and a helpmeet to her husband, a loving and care-taking mother she instructed her children in the ways of righteousness and she leaves them in the faith that a final meeting in that land not made by hands is theirs.
Many friends of the family deeply sympathize with the bereft and extend the hope that they may long be spared another like affliction in the family.
