#### Oregon News Notes

Aurora—\$10,000 raised to promote local pickle factory.

Astoria—Statewide honey producers and cooperative selling plan started here.

Gold Beach—New sanitarium costing \$20,000 will be opened here.

Portland—Admiral line buys two more passenger-freight steamers for coast trade.

Condon—Kinzun Lumber Company starts 24-mile railroad to 38,000-acre timber tract in Wheeler county.

Canby—Carload of high grade Jerseys shipped to British Columbia. Oregon will spend about \$15,000,000 on roads this year.

Canyon City—Six veins of coal, one of them six feet thick, opened on John Day River.

Many methods of destroying ground squirrels have been tried, but probably the most economical and satisfactory in all ways is the use of poison. The biological survey recommends the following: 16 quarts of barley, 1 ounce strychnine, 1 ounce baking soda, 1/2 ounce saccharine 1/4 pint heavy corn sirup, 1/4 pint thin starch paste, 1 tablespoon glycerine.

That the presence of absence of tuber discoloration in an unreliable guide to the presence or absence of wilt-producing fungi in potato tubers has been clearly shown on a number of occasions. This is far from being an infallible sign.

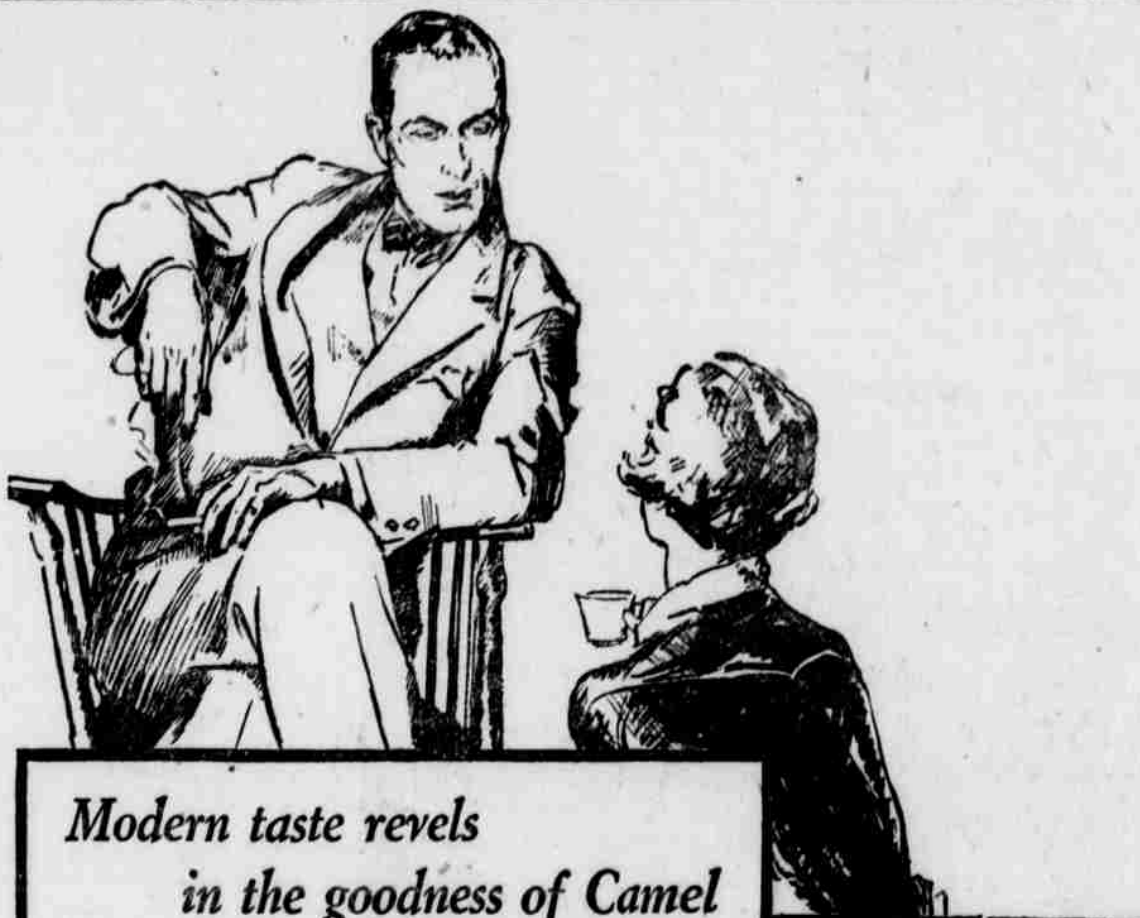
