Forest Fires and Game

Forest fires sweep across the nesting grounds of grouse and other game birds, destroying eggs and young birds. Fires destroy the forage upon which big game animals live. When fires occur late in the fall big game animals, especially deer, suffer during the following winter and frequently die of starvation. Fires spoil the fishing, for good fishing depends upon clear waters, and when the forest is destroyed by fire the resulting erosion muddies the streams and lakes and puts an end to good sport. If sportsmen realized how birds and animals are driven out by fire, how coverts and nests are destroyed, and how much food for wild life goes up in smoke when the forest burns, they would observe the utmost care with camp fires, smokes, and firearms, when in the woods.

Damages of \$6,250 Awarded In Malpractice Suit

Daughter of Mrs. W. H. Staats Plaintiff—Recovers From Two Doctors.

A case of rank malpractice on the part of a couple of Portland physicians resulted in a verdict of \$6,250 being awarded Mrs. Geo. H. Gill, daughter of Mrs. W. H. Staats in circuit court at Portland last week. Some time ago Mrs. Gill, who was suffering with a nervous malady, went to a doctor in Portland for consultation. While there she was told to go into the operating room. There, her doctor, with another physician, operated upon her in place of another lady who was awaiting the call to the operating table. The physicians were told of their error, but the operation being made there was no way in which they could undo their work.

Mrs. Gill, as soon as she was to be around, entered suit charging malpractice against the operating doctors, and a jury in Judge Hewitt's court awarded her the amount above as damages. Three of the jurors are said to have refused to sign the verdict, saying their idea was that of the full amount, \$15,000, should have been given the plaintiff.

Mr. and Mrs. Staats were called to Portland last week as witnesses for the plaintiff.

Great Northwestern Bridge

The proposed new bridge across the Columbia River at Longview and Rainier is interesting the people of Washington and Oregon.

At a recent state and federal hearing in Portland the following facts were brought out: Costs of bridge and approaches, \$3,400,000. Total length of bridge, 3618 feet. Approaches, 500 feet. Width of ship channel span, 750 feet, from center to center of high pier. Height of ship channel span above water, 165 feet. Depth of river in ship channel at low tide, 30 feet. Tolls for passengers and vehicles fixed by government agencies.

Bridge to be erected and maintained by private capital, without expense to Oregon of Washington, or to counties or cities on either side of the river.
