Lucky Sheep Drive.

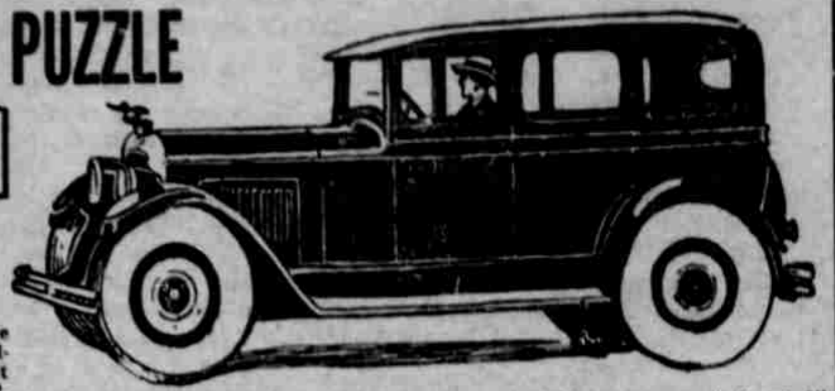
