News Of Busy Shaniko

All the local teachers were in attendance both days at the Wasco county institute held at the county seat September 12th and 13th. Among the outstanding educational talks was the one by State Superintendent, C. A. Howard on "Fundamentals of Education" The vital tasks of teachers he enumerated as follows: Teach the 3 R's, intellectual honesty, promote health and health habits, create practical tasks to supplement school work, and instill proper attitudes toward work. He criticized those who would blame the school for loose moral standards existing among the high school students in some localities. The school, he said was doing more than any one other agency to promote intellectual honesty and orality.
