#### Shaniko School Notes

The report of the last school month showed that less than 50% of all the pupils attended regularly, being neither absent nor tardy. This record is low compared with our attendance in October, when 90% of our pupils were perfect in attendance. Some of the recent absences were due to absence from the town, but most of them were due to illness. Perfect attendance recorded by departments were as follows: High school, 80%; Grammar school, 33 1-3%; Primary, 25%. Lets do better next month.

Having been startled by reading the above parents and guardians of the boys and girls will not feel so guilty when they learn that the percentage of attendance was 92 plus. It is a case of a large number of pupils being absent for short periods. There is, however, some room for
