A new map folder for the Mount Hood national forest has just been received at the district forester's office in Portland, Oregon.

This folder consists of the latest detailed map of the Mount Hood region showing roads, trails, streams, peak; and other topographic features. On the back of the map are statements covering the resources of the forest, such as timber, forage, water power and recreation. Automobile roads are shown in red.

The Mount Hood region is used by more hikers than any other national forest in the Northwest and there is, therfore, given a list of trail trips for this section.
