Three hundred salesmen will be employed in the company's sales campaign, the largest in its history. The company estimates that an additional million dollars will be necessary for supplies for lines and added facilities to take care of the new business.

"Electricity is cheap—you can use it freely" is the slogan being used in the campaign.
